Lord Howe Island Adventure

The skippers of Halcyon VI, Kaos and Yolo anxiously monitored the weather forecast in the week leading up to the planned departure to Lord Howe on Saturday second of April. As the departure time approached it became clear that there was a small window of weather open for our 40 hour trip to the middle of the Tasman Sea. We did however face a southerly change forecast for the first 12 hours and with this knowledge bravely decided that we should head off. We threw the lines at 10 AM on Saturday, waving goodbye to a small party of family and well-wishers left on the Marina.

After about three hours we were greeted by the forecasted southerly change with seas rising to 3 m and a fresh breeze 25 to 30kn on the beam. This made conditions quite uncomfortable for the next 12 hours. We arrived at Barcoo seamount at 10 AM next morning with high expectation of catching some game fish. After two or three hours we all concluded that it was best to head off as no one had a strike. This was a little disappointing as we all anticipated this to be a rich fishing ground. We set course and speed to arrive at Balls Pyramid 10 miles south-east of Lord Howe Island to arrive at dawn the next day. All three boats arrived on schedule to be greeted by a spectacular sunrise and an awesome rock spire.

After taking in the view we cruised to the lagoon at Lord Howe Island to be chaperoned in by the resident police officer/waterways/customs/good bloke, Andrew Mackay. Yolo and Kaos took up residence on moorings in the passage and Halcyon VI was guided to a mooring on the eastern side of Blackburn Island.

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Next day saw the weather turn foul. A blustery south-easterly over 40 knots produced 6 m seas that pounded onto the coral reefs outside the lagoon. We were safely moored, however at high tide the swell penetrated the lagoon making it uncomfortable on the moorings particularly at night. The current in the lagoon was unfavourable placing all the boats abeam to the sea.

The next two weeks were spent enjoying the sites, walks, diving, golfing, dining and fishing in and around this wonderful island.

There were some crew changes along the way and on 16 April the 3 boats set off for Elizabeth Reef for some fishing and diving. The reef is approximately 100 miles due north of Lord Howe, so we planned our departure at sunset to arrive at dawn. The fleet anchored on the northern side of Elizabeth Reef, enjoyed a hearty breakfast and began fishing. Those on Halcyon VI planned to explore the under water while the others enticed the fish to their bait. At around 8 AM Peter was on the radio enquiring as to when we were planning to leave for Middleton Reef. Kaos caught so many fish in that short time and all the freezers were full. The divers played with the cod and sharks.

At mid-morning we set off for Middleton Reef arriving there just after lunch. The crew on Kaos picked up some tuna and that evening we had a feast of sushimi that fed us all as we gathered for a barbecue on Halcyon VI that evening. We explored the wrecks on Middleton Island both above and below the water. There were some exciting dives with bronze whaler sharks who were very interested in our activities. On one dive we counted around 40 circling above us. They were placid and did not interfere, fortunately.

The anchorage at Middleton Reef is on the north-western corner where the reef forms a reasonably sheltered bay. The anchor can be dropped on sand and the holding is reasonable. Whilst we were there we experienced a south easterly breeze between 15 and 25kn over the two days. The moorings were reasonably comfortable with the wind holding the boats into the sea. The sunsets were spectacular and the feeling of isolation to be in such a pristine place in the middle of the South Pacific was awesome.

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The weather conditions for our journey back to Queensland were perfect. We had a slight south-easterly breeze all the way home which made the cruise very comfortable and uneventful. Kaos and Yolo made the course for Southport and Halcyon VI headed for Tweed Heads.

This was a great trip and one we hope to repeat in a couple of years. We hope that there will be a bigger fleet next time.
